

The Karl Junginger Memorial Library is offering a “Chill Out and Read” program to the children, teens and adults of the community to encourage them to read for pleasure during the winter months. Readers ages 18 and younger are awarded for reaching timed reading goals with a ticket to enter in the **prize drawings**.

Adults will receive a ticket to enter their own prize drawings with each book they complete. Everyone who participates will be invited to a special finale program with a performance by **The Amazing Schu** at the library on February 18th at 6pm where the prizes will be awarded!



Read It Down! Get R.I.D. of your library fines

Kids, do you want to reduce your fines? There's an easy way to do it and it won't cost you anything! Read It Down! or the R.I.D. Program is a library **fine** program for the youth in our community.

Here's how it works:

1st: Stop at the front desk and tell the librarian that you would like to start reading at the library right away. The librarian will note your reading start time on a form.

2nd: Read!

3rd: When you're done reading, return to the desk and tell the librarian you are done reading for the day. The librarian will note your ending time on the form and take the appropriate amount of money off your fine.

New Procedures and Expectations for Library Meeting Rooms

The goal of the Karl Junginger Memorial Library and its Board of Trustees is to have library facilities utilized to the greatest extent possible. Community groups are encouraged to use the Junginger Community Room and the Hyer Conference Room for activities in accordance with the guidelines outlined in it's handout. In brief, several steps will need to be followed before, during, and after your meeting or event:

Prior to your Meeting/Event

- Complete the reservation form. Make sure you reserve the room with time for setup and cleanup, so that groups aren't in conflict for space.
- Return the completed reservation form with separate checks for the deposit and rental fees (if applicable) to the library. **You must include a self-addressed stamped envelope for us to return your deposit check.**
- If you will need a key to access the facility, sign one out during library hours just before your event. **If you forget to pick up your key you will automatically forfeit your \$50 deposit. Do not contact staff at home for any reason.**
- **For a non-emergency situation please contact local police at 920-478-2343.**

During Your Meeting/Event

Monitor those in your group for compliance with the Facility Use Policy, which is available in print at the library's front desk and available online at www.waterloo.lib.wi.us

After Your Meeting/Event

- **Complete the Cleanup Checklist, sign and date.**
- **If the room is not clean and put back into the proper arrangement you forfeit your \$50 deposit.**
- **Leave the Cleanup Checklist on the kitchen counter in the Junginger Community Room or on the conference table in the Hyer Conference Room.**
- In addition to the cleanup checklist tables and chairs must be returned to their proper arrangement (refer to the laminated green cleanup checklist and room arrangement map).
- If you borrowed the library keys for the facility, return them in the outside book drop, after the door has been locked, if library is closed or at the front desk if the library is still open.
- If the library is closed during your event, or closes before your event has ended, please make absolutely certain that all lights are off and that all external doors your group uses are locked and secure.

Have You Met Our New Director Yet?



Kelli Mountford had served as the children's librarian from 2000 to 2007. She had been serving as elementary librarian in the Waterloo School District for the past six years and this year she was made district librarian, requiring more duties at the high school level and working with technology at the lower level.

Mountford received a bachelor's degree in education from Marian College in Fond du

Lac and received a master's degree in library science from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.


Mountford began as a part-time children's librarian in Waterloo in 2000, which eventually turned to a full-time position. "I loved it there and decided to get my master's degree," she said.

Mountford said she plans to integrate more technology at the library, such as having iPads and reading tablets available for in-house use. Currently, the library only offers desk computers. She would like to have the library offer some type of table device to allow patrons to come to the library to read and relax. The library has an annual circulation of 43,000. She would also like to update the young teen section and offerings. She also plans to continue the many programs that are offered by the library. "I love libraries, and I am excited to lead," the new director said. "I am looking forward to helping the community get back to the library."

It will be a new journey for the Waterloo resident. She was raised in Milwaukee and moved to Waterloo in 1999. Her husband, Jason, is employed at Trek, and they have two children, Amber who began her post secondary-education at Marian and a son, Beau, who resides in Madison.



KJM Library Outreach Services

Patrons unable to visit the KJM Library because of permanent or temporary disability, infirmity or mobility may request home delivery of materials by contacting the library 920-478-3344.

Standard Print and Large Print books are available as well as Books-on-CD, magazines, music CDs, and DVDs. Library staff can also acquire materials from other libraries for use by patrons using the Outreach Service.

A brief application for a library card may be required. Materials delivered to a patron through Outreach are checked-out for up to one month. Delivery of materials takes places on Tuesdays and Thursdays.



1000 Books Before Kindergarten Club Up, Up and Away Read Every Day@ The Karl Junginger Memorial Library

This free program encourages you to read 1000 books with your child before he or she enters school—a goal experts say children need to help them learn to read for themselves. One of the best ways to encourage learning is to spend time sharing books every day. Plus, sharing stories together is fun!

Here are the easy steps for participation:

1. **Read together**
2. **Write the titles** on your **Up, Up and Away Read Every Day** sheet.
3. **When you finish 100 books**, bring your sheet to the **library** and receive a surprise!
4. **After finishing 1000 books, your child** receives a book, certificate, and a jumpstart on school success!

This club has no end date except your child's going to school, so don't feel rushed—just enjoy the experience! By reading just **three stories a day** you and your child will have read **over 1000 books in one year**.

The library is a fun place featuring books to check out, free programs and great suggestions for what to read. Stop in often and talk to the friendly KJM Library staff—they are there to help.
